Overview

Food and Drug Administration – Approved Indications

Daraprim (pyrimethamine) is indicated for the treatment of toxoplasmosis when used conjointly with a sulfonamide, since synergism exists with this combination.

Clinical Guideline Coverage Criteria

The plan may authorize coverage of generic pyrimethamine when all the following criteria are met:

1. Used for the active treatment of toxoplasmosis

AND

- 2. Used in combination with BOTH of the following:
 - a. Leucovorin; AND
 - b. A sulfonamide (e.g., sulfadiazine)

Limitations

- 1. Requested duration should not exceed 8 weeks.
- 2. For a non-formulary medication request, please refer to the Pharmacy Medical Necessity Guidelines for Formulary Exceptions and submit a formulary exception request to the plan as indicated.

Background, Product and Disclaimer Information

Pharmacy Medical Necessity Guidelines have been developed for determining coverage for plan benefits and are published to provide a better understanding of the basis upon which coverage decisions are made. The plan revises and updates Pharmacy Medical Necessity Guidelines annually, or more frequently if new evidence becomes available that suggests needed revisions.
